And yet, in ten days or so, these valiant and magnificent elders of our community will be leaving on a mission, once again, showing an availability and an openness that I can testify to. Brothers of Christian Instruction once, Brothers of Christian Instruction always!

Allow me to share with you my perception of these missionary disciples who, from January 10 to 14, will leave two by two - as in the Gospel - to enrich with their quality of being the great inter-community fraternity of the **De-La-Salle Residence** in Laval.

Honor to whom honor is due, I begin with the **oldest**.


#### Br. Roland Chevalier, 99

The **dean of the Infirmary,** perhaps without really realizing it, remains famous for the incredible collection of **horses** that everyone has enjoyed giving him throughout his life. He is affable and gentle, still **witty** on his good days, pious, sensitive and with a deadpan sense of humor. And he remains a tenacious Montreal Canadiens fan!

The **luminous eyes** of this career bursar reflect a constant joy and an ever warm and eager **welcome** to people, including those he has never met. He loves to laugh and looks for ways to make people laugh. He nurtures curiosity, wonder, family ties, and never seems to be bored.




#### Br. Camille Tardif, 91

#### Br. Marius Tanguay, 86

He is simultaneously watchman and lighthouse, grandfather and child, walker and rest area.
